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PUP (Playwrights Under Progress) Fest Brings 6 New Plays to Life

DALLAS, TX - Junior Players and Kitchen Dog Theater are excited to announce that Playwrights Under Progress (PUP) Fest, the culminating event of their annual partnership with the Dallas Independent School District known as the Dallas Playwriting Arts Collective (D-PAC), will return to the stage this year for its 24th anniversary. Six scripts written by local high school playwrights have been selected for this year's production and will feature some of the area's top student actors. These plays will be presented as staged readings on Saturday, June 7, at I pm at Dallas College - Richland Campus in the Black Box theater in Fannin Hall.

This year's scripts include, in alphabetical order: Log 1,785 by Meagan Murphy (Booker T. Washington HSPVA), my queen by Tyler "Tai" Walker (Booker T. Washington HSPVA), On Another Rainy Night by Erica Turner (Bryan Adams High School), The Watcher by Javier Murillo (Hillcrest High School), Waiting for the Plug by Antonio Velazquez (Greenhill High School), and What's Wrong With Raising the Dead? by Hailey Bautista (W. H. Adamson High School). These six scripts were selected from a field of submissions from a variety of high schools from all over the Metroplex.

PUP Fest allows high school playwrights the opportunity to be mentored by some of Dallas' most renowned playwrights. Each script that is chosen is paired with a cast of teen actors and directed by local professional actors and directors. This year, PUP Fest mentors are local playwrights Erin Ryan Burdette and Omar Padilla, master class instructors are Jamal Sterling and Omar Padilla, and citywide workshop leaders are Erin Malone Turner and Nicole Neely. Serving as PUP Fest 2025 directors are Emily Lopez, Jamal Sterling, Raven Garcia Lawes, Rudy Lopez, Sasha Maya Ada Davis, and Sinan Beskok.

Performances will take place on Saturday, June 7, 2025 at I pm, in the Black Box theater in Fannin Hall Building F at Dallas College – Richland Campus, located at I2800 Abrams Rd, Dallas, TX 75243.
